



## Code of Ethics

WABA has a Code of Ethics, which covers people involved in boxing throughout Wales.

This Code encapsulates all of the sporting, moral and ethical principles that boxing represents and is intended for all participants and disciplines within the sport however they choose to participate – as a participant, coach, official, volunteer or a parent supporting on the sidelines.

Everyone involved in the sport should promote equality of access and opportunity, fairness and respect.

All those involved within WABA have a responsibility to act according to the highest standards of integrity and to ensure that the reputation of the sport is, and remains, high.

WABA is committed to creating and maintaining a safe and positive environment for all young people involved in boxing. It accepts a responsibility to help safeguard the welfare of young people and protect them from harm.

All clubs and others providing opportunities for young people in boxing must accept that they are required to fulfil their duty of care, which means that they must do everything that can be reasonably expected of them to help safeguard and protect young people from any reasonably foreseeable harm.

### Definitions

Young people: any person under the age of 18.
